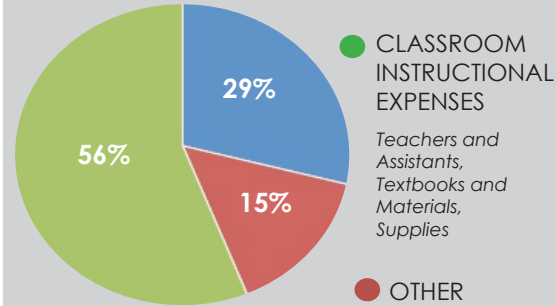

MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the Williamsport Area School District (WASD) is to develop responsible citizens through excellence in education.

SCHOOL DISTRICT

WASD is situated in the county seat of Lycoming County and encompasses 98 square miles. With a student population of 5,033 students, WASD provides the most comprehensive offerings in academic support programs, interventions, course selections, athletics, fine arts programs and school activities in the region. Student achievement scores rank competitively with regional and state averages. The community's diverse population also plays an integral role in the dynamics of the school district.

WASD is recognized as one of the Best Communities for Music Education by the NAMM Foundation. WASD is also a regional leader in Career & Technical Education, providing more than 15 programs with industry recognized credentials verifying student skill attainment.

COMMUNITY

Williamsport is well-known for its role in Little League Baseball, which was conceived in 1939 by Carl Stotz. It has grown to become the largest youth organization in the world. Williamsport is proud to be served by two institutions of higher learning. Lycoming College is a private, coeducational, four-year college. Pennsylvania College of Technology is an affiliate of Pennsylvania State University and is one of Pennsylvania's premier technical colleges.

UNIQUE PROGRAMS

- Students have the opportunity to participate in a multitude of clubs, such as STEM Club and a number of service clubs, such as American Red Cross and Recycling Club.
- Extensive enrichment opportunities are available for students at the elementary and secondary levels, including a K-6 gifted curriculum, more than 60 Honors and Advanced Placement (AP) course offerings, and collegiate experiences available for FREE through our dual enrollment program.
- The Williamsport Area School District Education Foundation helps to annually raise private and corporate funds in support of district programs and initiatives.
- The Williamsport Area High School's Career and Technical Education program continues to exceed state and national benchmarks with its NOCTI performance, industry certification attainment and graduation rate.
- WASD supports 55 sporting opportunities, 19 of which are at the varsity level for students in grades 7-12. Athletic facilities are maintained for football, basketball, baseball, softball, track and field, swimming and diving, wrestling, tennis, and soccer.
- More than 70 musical ensembles are available in the district including orchestra, band and chorus programs.
- The high school has the largest campus in the region including unique facilities such as an in-house planetarium and integrated science labs, Olympic-size pool, PC repair laboratory, Black-Box theater, and a top-notch performance auditorium.
