The 2018-2019 school year marked the Foundation’s 15th anniversary as the district’s nonprofit affiliate. Thanks to the generosity of our donors and partners, we’ve been fortunate enough to grow in our effort to add value to the academic experience of our students. Last year closed out the first half of the second decade of our existence. We’re pleased to report that, in that time, we received more than \$2.2 million in contributions and granted more than \$1.8 million to WASD.

As a foundation, we rely heavily on our community to make all of what we do possible. Last year, WASDEF received \$339,852 in total revenue from more than 380 donors and we granted nearly \$125,000 to enrich WASD programs. For that, we THANK YOU!

We want to continue to build on our success moving forward. Outlined in our five-year strategic plan are two key areas we’ve identified to help us grow. We want to continue building on our endowment structure to provide a permanent funding source to support our key program areas. Led by a 21-member volunteer board, WASDEF facilitates charitable giving and permanent legacies based on individual areas of interest in educational innovation, the arts, athletics and scholarships.

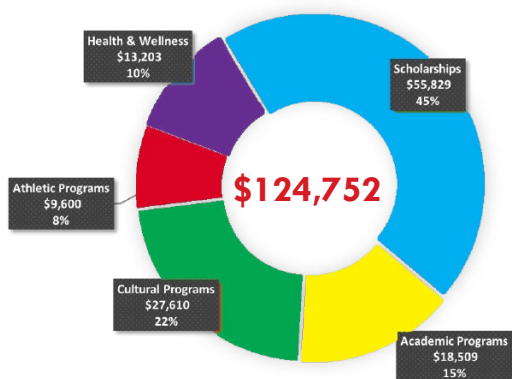
Thanks to loyal and dedicated donors, WASDEF generated \$339,852 in total revenue during the 2018-2019 school year and granted \$124,752 to provide opportunities that Williamsport area students may not

otherwise have gotten to experience.

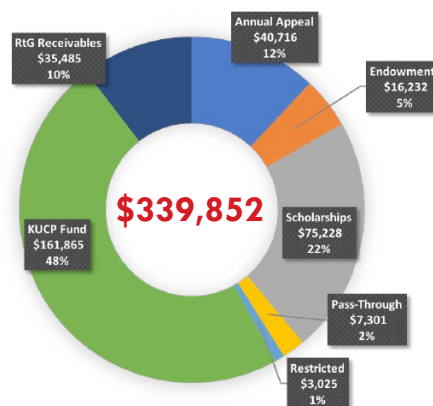
Since 2014, the education foundation has both raised and allocated more than \$2.2 million to the district to help fund capital projects, innovative programs and initiatives, and scholarships. In that same time, the foundation also has grown by \$572,337.

Over the course of the last decade, WASDEF has grown in its mission in supporting students across the district by funding educational enhancements. As of June 30, 2019, WASDEF reached — for the first time — more than \$2 million in net assets.

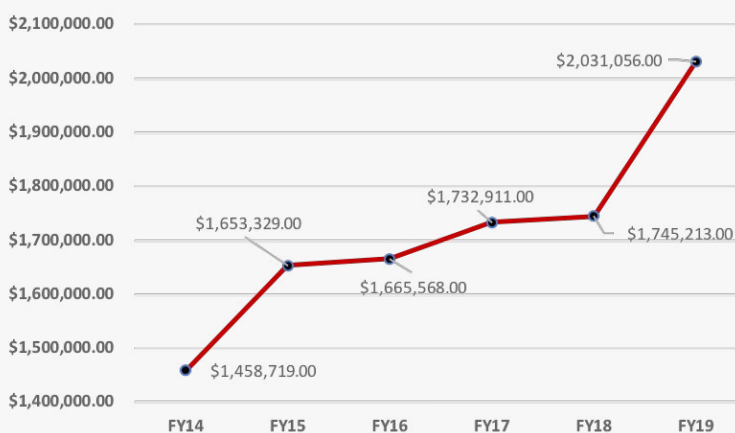

Intermediate Schools Receive Funding to Support **Digital Music Curriculum**, Recording Studios

In one of its single largest grants given to date, WASDEF granted **\$16,340** to the intermediate school music program to support the implementation of a new digital music curriculum, using funds from the foundation's Violet Compton Estate Fund.

The new curriculum has already helped to form a foundation for digital music education, such as how to create ringtones and remixes/mash-ups, for fifth- and sixth-grade students.

"The technology has allowed students to record their music creations in both written and video form," said Jennifer Wright, a music teacher at Lycoming Valley Intermediate School. "The digital arranging projects have been highly engaging and opened students' eyes to another possible

career in the arts."

Music teachers Jeff Smith and Don Fisher also implemented recording studios at Curtin and Lycoming Valley Intermediate schools, respectively, from a combined **\$3,000** in grant funding through WASDEF's Teacher Mini-Grant Program.

In addition to other capabilities, the studios allow students to use professional software to record individual, small group or large-group performances.

"I have been very impressed with their creativity," Smith said. "They will record everything from band music with loops to completely composing and producing their own songs."

Foundation Funds Launch of Girls Volleyball Program at Middle School

A **\$9,600** grant last spring to the district’s athletic program was used to launch a girls volleyball team at Williamsport Area Middle School during the 2019-2020 school year.

The grant was used to provide initial funding for the program, supporting costs associated with equipment, uniforms, transportation and coaches.

Since 2016, Dr. Frederic Sanford’s gifts to WASDEF have helped to support the Strolling Strings, upgrades to the high school’s planetarium, and, during the 2017-2018 school year, he became the initial founder of the Academic Programs Endowment Fund (see page 8).

Part of Dr. Sanford’s philanthropic motivation came nearly a decade ago when he reflected on his experiences at WASD. It wasn’t long before then that he watched the Strolling Strings perform at a class reunion. So moved by the performance and their hard work, he knew he wanted to support them.

And in 2016, the opportunity surfaced.

“Whether they used it for travel expenses — or anything — it didn’t matter to me as long as I was helping,” he said.

Having served on a number of boards throughout his lifetime, Dr. Sanford knows the power in philanthropy. His rekindled connection with his alma mater reawakened a sense of pride and appreciation for the work WASD does to prepare its students for their future, and the work WASDEF does to support that effort.

Grants Support **Academic Enhancements**

Four programs and initiatives were funded through the foundation's inaugural Challenge Grant Program and annual Teacher Mini-Grant Program.

This year, the education foundation awarded **\$8,283** to fund the following five classroom programs that had a direct benefit on about 600 students:

Purposeful Writing Through Game Design Studio

Williamsport Area Middle School teachers Dustin Brouse and Kelly Taormina-Keller were awarded **\$1,499** to support a shared program that combines seventh- and eighth-grade English Language Arts and technology, using the gaming industry as its platform. The program allows students to play school-appropriate video games to review for their peers, using the conventions of argumentative and persuasive writing, and storytelling. Using the building's new FutureLab, students also are able to get a hands-on experience in studying careers related to the industry.

Sphero Robots Added to WAMS FutureLab

A **\$2,704** grant enhanced the seventh-grade robotics curriculum. Funding helped to purchase six Sphero Bolt Robots, four iPads and accessories to complete assigned projects. The enhancement allows students to focus on basic programming, trouble-shooting programming issues, advanced programming, how to use programming to approach different types of tasks, and basic coding with JavaScript.

Lobby of Literacy

Jackson Primary School used a **\$1,230** grant to support enhancements to its Lobby of Literacy. For a few hours each Wednesday through the summer, students are able to keep up with their learning by showing up to read and participate in a number of other educational activities.

Enhanced Scholar Program Sponsorship (WVIA)

With funding provided by WASDEF, the district was among Lycoming County schools participating in WVIA's Enhanced Scholar Program, which provides a way to showcase their talented students and support teachers with resources and professional development.



Funding Helps **Celebrate Academic Success**

'Grow Your Own': WASDEF Supports Creation of New Club

As part of a district-led effort to attract and retain teachers in a "grow your own" strategy, **\$1,000** was granted to the Williamsport Area School District to launch a new club called Educators Rising.

Formerly known as Future Teachers of America, the club was initiated this year at Williamsport Area High and Middle schools. The purpose of the club is to allow advisors to "cultivate highly skilled educators by guiding young people on a path to becoming accomplished teachers ... extending through college and into the profession."

The club was borne out of the efforts of the district's Strategic Recruitment Committee, which works to not only build a more diverse professional staff, but also develop ways to increase its teaching candidacy pool in the face of a national teacher shortage.

"Data suggests more than 60 percent of all teachers teach within a 20-mile radius from where they went to high school," said Assistant Superintendent Dr. Susan Bigger. "Ultimately, by introducing our students to the profession early, the hope is that these same students will return to

their home school district to teach, paying forward the benefits of their K-12 education at WASD."

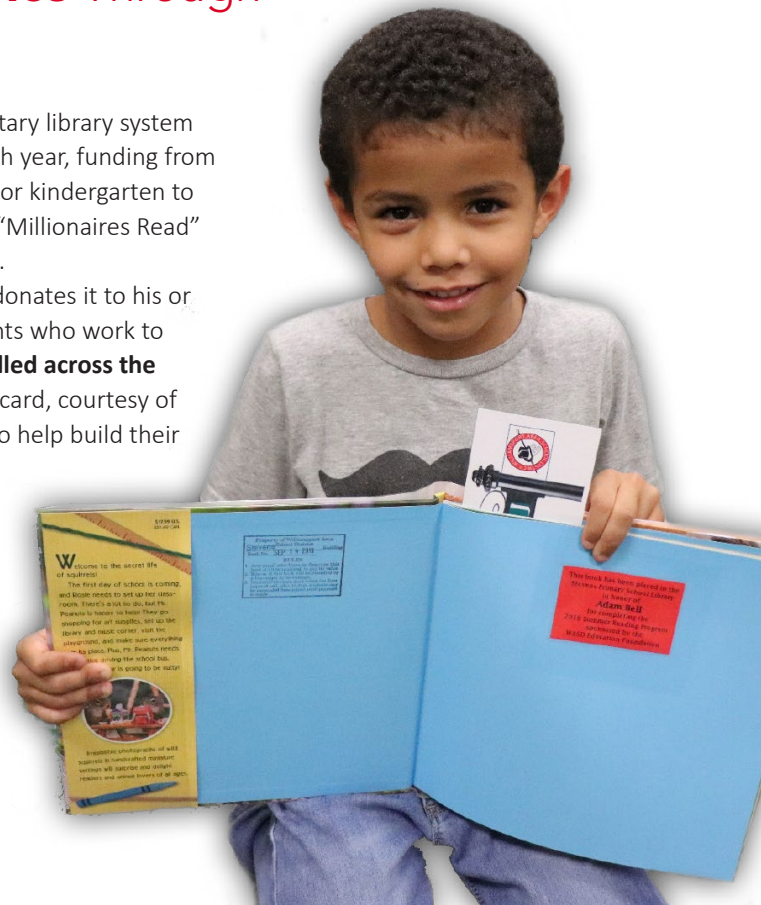
#MillionairesRead: Building Libraries Through Literacy

Since 2011, WASDEF has granted **1,129 new books** to the elementary library system to help grow its inventory as a result of summer reading efforts. Each year, funding from the Foundation is used to purchase new books to recognize and honor kindergarten to sixth-grade students who successfully complete either the district's "Millionaires Read" or the James V. Brown Library's summer reading program — or both.

Each book purchased is dedicated to a summer reader who then donates it to his or her respective school library. The program pays tribute to the students who work to help build their school libraries. **In 2018, 152 new books were installed across the district.** In addition to a book, each "completer" was given a \$5 gift card, courtesy of Otto Bookstore, to put toward the purchase of a book of their own to help build their home libraries.

Endowment Creation

Creating an endowment at the Foundation provides funding to the Williamsport Area School District in perpetuity. The establishment of an endowment fund gives donors the opportunity to impact the lives of present and future generations of students by creating a permanent stream of funding in their particular area of interest.

During the 2017-2018 school year, WASDEF worked to further expand its future impact on enhancing educational opportunities for students with the creation of several endowment funds. These funds, once the minimum criteria is reached to begin distribution, **will help to support enhancements in the academic, cultural and athletic programs that exist throughout the district, or provide financial assistance to graduates to further their education.**

To date, five endowment funds have been created at WASDEF:

- Endowment for Academic Programs
- Quasi-Endowment for Athletics
- Endowment for Cultural Programs
- The Thomas Kelchner Memorial Scholarship for the Arts
- Youth Mentorship Program Endowment Fund

The Thomas Kelchner Memorial Scholarship for the Arts

This fund was established by **Caitlin Winner '01** in memory of late WAHS art teacher Mr. Thomas Kelchner, who passed away in 2006. The permanent fund will provide financial assistance to graduating seniors who have demonstrated outstanding aptitude in the visual arts and to help them realize success in the discipline. This year marked the first distribution from the fund. As of June 30, 2019, the fair market value of the fund was \$21,012.

The WASD Education Foundation Endowment for Academic Programs

This fund was established to provide district-wide support for innovative academic enhancements. The fund was created by one of the foundation's initial endowment founders, **Dr. Frederic Sanford '58**. As of June 30, 2019, the fair market value of the fund was \$12,684.86. The foundation is working to get this permanent fund to \$100,000 to meet the criteria for distribution.



The WASD Education Foundation Endowment for the Arts

This fund was established to provide district-wide support for visual and performing arts programs. The fund was created by one of the foundation's initial general endowment founders, **Mrs. Anita Gibbons**. As of June 30, 2019, the fair market value of the fund was \$13,332.06. The foundation is working to get this permanent fund to \$100,000 to meet the criteria for distribution.

The WASD Education Foundation Quasi-Endowment for Athletics

This fund was established to provide support for the district's athletic program. The fund was created by one of the foundation's initial general endowment founders, **Dr. David Raemore '69**. As of June 30, 2019, the fair market value of the fund was \$34,137.13. The quasi-endowment will allow WASDEF to liquidate a portion (but not all) of the fund to support capital or programmatic needs.



Youth Mentorship Program Endowment Fund

Established in 2016 by **Beth McMahon '76** and her husband, Frank, this permanent fund was created for WAHS students to lead a mentorship program for the benefit of their younger peers at the middle school. As of June 30, 2019, the market value of the fund was \$14,919.47. Since 2017, the foundation has distributed **\$1,098** to support efforts of the program.

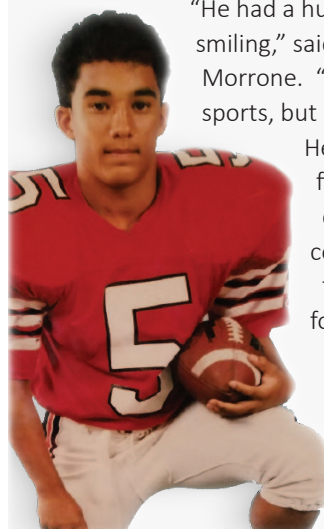

It was awarded for the first time this year.

"He smiled a lot — every day," said friend Travis Dawson.

"He had a huge heart and was always smiling," said friends Cris and Jenna Morrone. "He had a passion for sports, but loved football the most.

He was a great player on the field, but an even better coach. He had a way to connect with kids and get them to perform their best for him."

As of June 30, 2019, the scholarship fund's fair market value was \$21,417.39.

Through their children, Dr. Philip Sprunger and wife, Elizabeth, know the value of the district's educational program. They also know that it often takes extra resources to provide an even stronger academic experience.

"Schools always operate in the reality of tight budgets," Sprunger said. "The WASD Education Foundation can provide the sort of enrichment extras that can make a difference."

The two applaud the work of WASD teachers, and recognize the WASDEF's support of teachers' work in the classroom.

Not only have the two provided financial gifts to support the work of the Foundation, Sprunger also has given his time, having served on the Foundation's board of directors from 2009-2015.

Most recently the two committed their support of the Kids United Community Playground project (see page 14), of which WASDEF is a partner in the effort.

"As parents of a child with special needs and another child who had a wonderful experience at Stevens, we were particularly happy to support the construction of the accessible playground project at Stevens Primary School," he said.

Partnerships in Action: WASDEF Joins Effort to Help Realize New All-Inclusive Playground

The Kids United Community Playground is a collaborative community project formed out of a joint partnership between the Williamsport Kiwanis Club, Williamsport Rotary Club, WASDEF, American Rescue Workers and the Stevens Primary School PTA.

With a proposed location at Stevens Primary School, the fundraising team’s mission is “to build a positive, healthy,

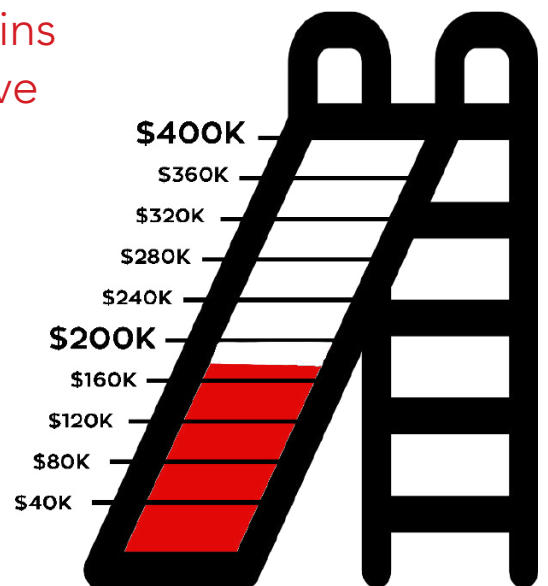

fun environment inspiring our whole community to learn, imagine and play together.”

Over the course of the 2018-2019 school year, 33 donors contributed \$170,968 toward the \$400,000 goal (as of June 30).

The playground will feature equipment that contributes to the five elements of inclusive play.

It will include poured rubber flooring, accessible ramps for wheelchairs and other assistive devices. It also will have traditional equipment and structures that encourage imaginative and cognitive play, fitness and instrumental



activities, including: Sensory Panels, Whirl with Me, Oval Swing, Conga Drums, Reflection Swing, Max Climb Summit, and the Rock ‘n Wave.

Grants Support Prevention, Health & Wellness Programs

WASDEF distributed **\$13,203** in funding to provide support to some of the prevention, health and wellness programs across all levels of the district:

TRU Program

A **\$5,000** grant received from the American Lung Association helped support drug and tobacco prevention programs at the middle school.

'Wounds You Cannot See'

Between two visits to the district, youth advocate and author Rodney Walker worked with counselors and connected with more than 100 students who had been through adverse or traumatic experiences. Mr. Walker

offered them ways to work through the healing process and toward positive growth.

BackPack Program

WASDEF continued to support of the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank's BackPack Program at WAHS. A \$200,000 grant secured by the food bank from the First Community Foundation Partnership of Pennsylvania in 2018 also helped to launch the program district-wide.

Needlework Guild of America

A partnership with Needlework Guild of America provided nearly 1,000 items, such as clothing and coats, to students in need in 2018.



Funding Continues for Odyssey of the Mind

WASDEF granted **\$8,227** to the Odyssey of the Mind teams that made their way to the World Finals at Michigan State University in May.

The Foundation was able to contribute a combination of gifts received from those in the community, area businesses and WASDEF's unrestricted fund.

Of the eight contending teams from the district that competed at the state competition in April, teams representing Cochran Primary and Williamsport Area Middle schools advanced to the World Finals.

Williamsport Area Middle School secured a historic Division II, third-place win for "Leonardo's Workshop" and Cochran Primary School earned a Division I, 12th-place spot for "Opposites Distract."

This was the fifth consecutive year WASD teams have competed at the international level.

In 2018, two teams from Curtin and WAMS were successful in the program's regional, state and world



competitions. Those teams competed at Iowa State University, both ranking in the top 25.

Since 2016, WASDEF has contributed \$28,166 to World Finals-bound teams.

Odyssey of the Mind is a competition that blends creativity, engineering and teamwork. It is 100 percent student-directed, with adult coaches acting as guides.

Over the Edge

In collaboration with the River Valley Regional YMCA and YWCA Northcentral PA, the WASD Education Foundation conducted the area's first Over the Edge (OTE) event on Oct. 27, 2018.

OTE allows members of the community to voluntarily commit to raise at least \$1,000 for the nonprofit of their choice — or have it divided evenly among all three — in a daring exchange to rappel from the top of the Lycoming County Housing Authority's William Hepburn High Rise Apartments downtown.

WASDEF raised **\$13,376** during the event.

Together, the nonprofits collectively generated more than \$50,000 for their organizations through the efforts of about 70 "edgers."



Annual Golf Outing

The WASD Education Foundation hosted its 14th annual Golf Tournament on June 24 at the Williamsport Country Club to benefit the Athletic Program Endowment Fund (see page 9).

This year's event, once again presented by Aramark, raised **\$8,831**.

Beginning in the 2017-2018 school year, it was decided that tournament proceeds would be directed to support and jump-start the revenues needed to grow the new endowment fund. The fund ultimately will help enhance students' health and wellness experience at WASD.

Together, the last two golf outings have generated more than \$21,000 for the endowment fund, which will be used to provide a permanent funding source to offset capital improvement and program needs for the district's athletic program.





Funding Innovation

Students at the intermediate and middle schools found a new learning experience waiting for them when they returned to school last fall.

Each of the three buildings were outfitted with new, specially-designed classrooms called FutureLabs to support innovative learning.

A **\$9,352** EITC grant helped to upgrade lab space and fund equipment at Lycoming Valley Intermediate School.

While STEM concepts have already been embedded across every grade level, the district officially adopted a curriculum and designed physical locations to bring a cohesive approach to its future ready philosophy and further next-generation learning opportunities.

The district worked with Creative Learning Systems, based in Longmont, CO, to install the FutureLabs at Curtin and Lycoming Valley Intermediate schools and Williamsport Area Middle School.

Equipped with cutting-edge technology, the labs are designed for students to work in teams to develop projects in the areas of scientific data and analysis, circuitry, computer graphics, media arts, mechanics and structures, alternative and renewable energy, software engineering, and robotics and control technology.

Students start using the labs in sixth grade and continue through middle school.

“The labs are providing an unprecedented learning opportunity for our students beginning in sixth grade that strongly support our district-wide college-and-career-readiness effort through project-based learning,” said John Killian, supervisor of elementary curriculum.

Educational Improvement Tax Credit Program at WASD

The Pennsylvania Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) Program is administered by the state Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) under Act 48. Established in 2001, the program awards tax credits to businesses that make contributions to scholarship organizations and/or educational improvement organizations that are on a list approved and published by DCED.

The WASD Education Foundation actively pursues EITC dollars from approved businesses and identifies eligible programs for funding on behalf of the school district. EITC funds for WASD are held at and administered by the First Community Foundation Partnership of Pennsylvania (FCFP). Since 2009, more than \$160,000 has supported 40 venture or educator-in-residence programs.

In 2018-2019, \$30,852 in grant funding was approved for three WASD programs, supporting academic enhancements and cultural programs.

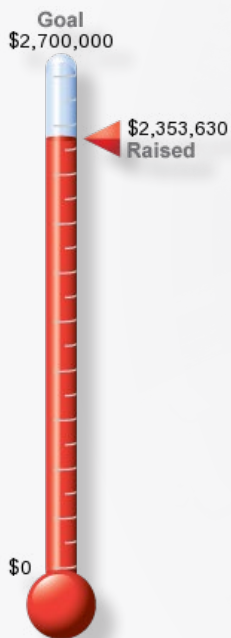

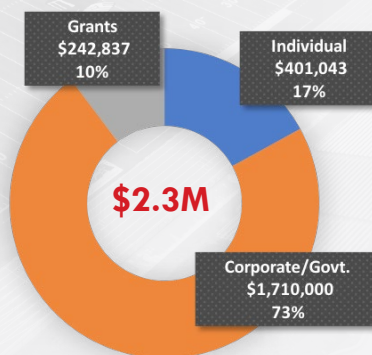
Return to Glory

Capital Campaign Results



In October 2013, WASDEF launched a five-year fundraising initiative. Setting a goal of \$2.7 million, the Foundation worked to restore and update WAHS's aging athletic complex with its *Return to Glory* capital campaign. The plans for modernizing the high school athletic facilities included the installation of a new all-weather field and new eight-lane track.
