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Homework

Electronic Devices: Electronics should not be seen or heard in the classroom. School-wide expectations apply.


Exiting Class: The teacher, not the bell, dismisses you upon completion of daily tasks. Gather your belongings & throw away any trash on, under, or around your desk.

Positive & Negative Consequences

Meeting classroom expectations and behaving appropriately in class helps to create a learning environment where you and your classmates feel welcome, safe, and respected.

If you choose to meet the classroom expectations, you will receive a **positive consequence**, such as praise from teacher, classmates, administration, "Shout Outs," a positive note or phone call home, special privileges and/or activities, and rewards.

If you choose not to meet the classroom expectations, you will receive a **negative consequence**, such as a verbal warning, a change of seat, a student/teacher conference, a phone call home, a detention, a parent/guardian meeting; and for severe infractions of school rules, office discipline referrals.
