PAVING THE WAY FOR 1ST-GENERATION COLLEGE STUDENTS

Williamsport native and WAHS graduate Jim Sullivan '70 and his older brother were the first in their family to attend college. The value of the education Jim received at the University of Colorado was passed on to his children, now graduates of the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

To continue supporting future generations in their pursuit of higher education, Jim and his wife, Annette, endowed the Jim Sullivan and Family Scholarship Fund at the WASD Education Foundation. Funds generated from the endowment will be used to support a WAHS grad who is the first member of their family to attend a college or university and commits to participating in a free online mentorship program, America Mentors, to help guide them to graduation starting on their first day.

"Families are usually positively transformed when a high school graduate pursues higher education," Jim said, "but the majority of first-generation college students drop out by sophomore year due to a lack of direction, support and mentorship."

This requirement, Jim said, will help students navigate the unfamiliar collegiate processes and challenges.

Now a resident of Appleton, Wisconsin, Jim is the CEO and founder of Sullivision.com, a food service and retail industry resource for results-driven training tools and programs. His clients include Walt Disney, McDonald's, American Express, Panera Bread, and Starbucks.

"The Sullivan family hopes that by establishing this scholarship, we will help deserving Williamsport students and families improve both their future and our communities," Jim said. "Go Millionaires!"

TIM MONTGOMERY MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND ESTABLISHED TO 'CARRY ON HIS LEGACY'

A new scholarship fund was created at the WASD Education Foundation last fall in memory of Tim Montgomery, WAHS's winningest coach.

The Tim Montgomery Memorial Scholarship Fund was established by his family to memorialize the health and physical education teacher who taught at WAHS and coached the Millionaire football team for more than 25 years.

He passed away at the age of 74 on Aug. 15 after a long battle with cancer.

Montgomery came to WAHS in 1977 from Shamokin. It was a move that laid the foundation for a storied career and one that earned him a spot in the Pennsylvania Scholastic Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2003 as the winningest coach in WAHS's 120-year history. His coaching career at WAHS amassed a record of 165 wins, 93 losses and three ties.

He retired in 2001.

"As a dedicated (teacher) and head football coach, he exemplified the hard work, discipline and honor he taught to his students and athletes," his family stated. "His dry sense of humor and caring for young men and women impacted generations. Coach Montgomery's family, friends, students and players would like to establish this scholarship in his memory to carry on his legacy."

Future recipients of the scholarship must be a "football player of outstanding character who plans to continue his education and who displays qualities that Coach Montgomery valued. The recipient should demonstrate integrity and hard work, both in the classroom and on the field."

WITH COMMITTEES IN PLACE, WASD CONTINUES FEASIBILITY STUDY PROCESS

Last spring, the WASD Board of Directors authorized the commission of a district-wide feasibility study to develop a long-range comprehensive facilities improvement plan and to determine current facility project needs.

Last fall, the school board hired Crabtree, Rohrbaugh & Associates, of Mechanicsburg, to conduct the study.

"Our goal is to get a clear and defined picture on the state of our facilities so that we can develop a prioritized course of action," said Superintendent Dr. Timothy S. Bowers. "The health of the district not only depends upon the strength and relevancy of our programs but also on the state and conditions of our buildings. We believe strongly in protecting our assets. The results of the study will help us to develop a plan that keeps us on pace and as cost-effective as possible in our operations."

Not since the 2007-2008 academic year has the district undergone a

comprehensive feasibility study, which, at the time, served as a launching pad for the 2013 district-wide grade reconfiguration and the construction and renovation projects at WAHS and what is now WAMS.

Since October, the firm has conducted an examination on the state of all nine of the district's buildings. It also has been working closely with a core team of district administrators and board members. In addition, the district also assembled a 30-member community steering committee to be involved and provide input into the process with the architectural firm.

While major developments have yet to occur, the architects hope to provide a slate of options later this spring or summer.

COCHRAN PRIMARY NAMED 2019-2020 TITLE 1 DISTINGUISHED SCHOOL

The 1500 Cherry St.-school is one of 93 across the Commonwealth selected for ranking among the top 5 percent of Title 1 schools that exhibited academic growth during the two most recently completed school years.

Cochran was formally recognized at the 2020 PA Title 1 Improving School Performance Conference in Pittsburgh on Jan. 27.

PDE defines Title 1 as a "100 percent federally funded supplemental education program that provides financial assistance to local educational agencies to improve educational opportunities for educationally deprived children. Title 1 programs are designed to help children meet the state content and performance standards in reading, language arts, and mathematics."

The driving factors that Principal Cindy Schuyler said she believes helped the recognition is not only the high-quality instruction students receive at Cochran but also the support of the district administration and the school community as a whole.

"It's apparent that what is done on a daily basis is good for our students," Schuyler said. "One common factor that our students get is quality instruction from quality teachers, along with the entire Cochran community helping as a support system. Our entire staff deserves recognition for their effort in helping us achieve this honor."

"What an honor to be recognized among the top schools across the state," said WASD Federal Programs Director Patricia Wylie. "I'm proud of the work of our faculty and students to show such growth. We will continue to focus our efforts on academic achievement for all students."

"For Cochran Primary to be recognized as a Title 1 Distinguished School is a testament to the hard work our faculty and administration put in every day to ensure our students succeed academically," said Superintendent Dr. Timothy S. Bowers. "I congratulate them on this honor and commend them for their efforts."

WAHS JUNIOR EARNS 1ST PLACE WIN AT POETRY OUT LOUD COMPETITION

Junior **Oam Patel** competed at the Poetry Out Loud state championship after securing a first-place win at the regional level in Towanda on Jan. 8.

Patel earned his first-place win by reciting "Dream Song 14" by John Berryman, "After Working 60 Hours Again for What Reason?" by Bob Hicok, and "Charles Sumner" by Charlotte L. Fortin Grimke.

The 2020 state championship took place on March 9 at the Harrisburg State Museum.

\$35,000 PAsmart Grant to Fund Start of New AP Computer Science Course

This winter, WASD learned through State Sen. Gene Yaw's office that it was among five other local school districts to receive a \$35,000 PAsmart grant.

Funds from the grant will be used to expand access to STEM and computer science opportunities at WAHS through the implementation of a new Advanced Placement (AP) computer science course, an addition to the 16 AP courses already available.

"The development and delivery of the College Board AP computer science course is unique to the area and demonstrates the school district's commitment to academic excellence and pursuit of leading-edge curriculum," said Superintendent Dr. Timothy S. Bowers. "The grant was written collaboratively by Director of Federal Programs Patricia Wylie and Assistant Superintendent Dr. Susan Bigger. The grant will enhance the multiple STEM opportunities within WASD, and prepare our students with the skills and abilities to meet the economic needs of the 21st century."

The new AP course will be available to WAHS students beginning in the 2020-2021 school year.

According to the Pennsylvania Department of Education, Gov. Tom Wolf secured \$40 million in 2019 to strategically invest in education and workforce development through PAsmart. The Pennsylvania Workforce Development Board provided recommendations and approved the framework for the funding priorities.

"These state investments in STEMbased education and computer science enable us to continue to build a highlyskilled workforce across Pennsylvania," Sen. Yaw said. "I thank the Governor and Education Secretary Rivera on this important funding to our local intermediate unit and schools."



WASD PUBLISHES 1ST ANNUAL REPORT TO PUBLIC

WASD released its first-ever annual report earlier this year, highlighting the district's key activities, data and financials between July 1, 2018, and June 30, 2019.

"This publication is meant to serve as a reflection on the 2018-2019 school year," writes Superintendent Dr. Timothy S. Bowers and school board President Lori Baer on its opening page. "It is meant to provide an account to you on what we believe was an important year for us here at WASD."

In addition to serving as an

accountability piece, it was produced to help further the district's efforts to "raise awareness of the work being done and give our stakeholders a snapshot of what we are able to accomplish with the resources and support provided to us," according to Bowers and Baer.



He's also worked as a speechlanguage pathologist for the Randolph County School System in Cuthbert, Georgia, before moving into his latest administrative post.

A New Castle, Pennsylvania, native, DeSantis earned a Bachelor of Arts in Business Administration from Slippery Rock University, a master's degree in Speech-Language Pathology from Edinboro University, and an educational specialist degree in Educational Leadership from Columbus State University. He also holds educational leadership and speech-language pathology certifications in both Pennsylvania and Georgia.
