2020-2021 EMPLOYEE GIVING CAMPAIGN RAISES \$6,926

A matching contribution from campaign sponsor, **Larson Design Group**, doubled the impact of staff giving this year.

With a matching contribution from Larson Design Group (LDG), WASDEF was able to raise \$6,926 through its second Employee Giving Campaign this winter.

"LDG is pleased to partner with the WASD and support a foundation that provides crucial funding and programs for the district," said LDG President and Chief Executive Officer David Martin. "Community stewardship is a core value at LDG, where we aim to enrich the places in which we live and work. No effort is more valuable to that goal than ensuring the success of students and educators alike."

"We're extremely grateful to have LDG as a partner in this year's effort," said Executive Director Greg Hayes. "Because of their generous commitment, we were able to double every new and increased pledge WASD employees made through our payroll deduction program this year."

WASDEF has experienced a 48% increase in annual commitments through its payroll deduction program since the start of the 2019-2020 school year. This year, the foundation saw a 10% increase in participation, bringing the total number of contributing employees to 110, accounting for about \$10,000 a year.

"We like to say it's one of the easiest ways to give, and we've been very grateful for the response," Hayes said. "A small bi-weekly contribution deducted from each paycheck can add up to make a huge difference within the larger volume of support."

FOUNDATION GRANTS SUPPORT EDUCATOR-IN-RESIDENCE, TV STUDIO ENHANCEMENTS AND ADDITIONS

Last fall, the WASD Education Foundation awarded two grants totaling \$4,379 to support programs at both the middle and high schools.

A \$1,500 grant from the foundation's Teacher Mini-Grant Fund supported an educator-in-residence program in the visual and theatre arts departments at WAHS, facilitated by teachers Andrea McDonough Varner and Marie Fox. The grant funded a series of workshops led by local storyteller Rachel Bush. Bush worked virtually with students on developing and refining their storytelling abilities that they, in turn, expressed through their respective discipline, all of which culminated in recorded performances and 2D visual artwork.

Additionally, a \$2,879 grant from the foundation's Annual Fund supported improvements to the middle school's television studio (shown at right). The grant expanded and enhanced the functionality of the studio space with new video editing software and production equipment, bringing the eight-year-old space more up-to-date with a broader range of capabilities.

The enhancements also were supported by a \$2,700 grant from the First Community Foundation Partnership of Pennsylvania through Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) donations received from Citizens & Northern, First National Bank of PA, M&T Bank, UPMC Health Plan and Woodlands Bank.

"We're proud to support these



two efforts that bring added value, experience and opportunity to student learning and skill development," said WASDEF Executive Director Greg Hayes. "We're thankful for those who support the education foundation, which enables us to continue to provide these opportunities, and for WASD partners, like the First Community Foundation Partnership of Pennsylvania, which helps to deliver more of an educational impact through EITC donations."

New All-Inclusive Playground Coming to Cochran Primary School this Summer

A multi-organizational partnership has generated more than \$430,000 to fund what will become the Kids United Community Playground, which is now scheduled for installation this summer at Cochran Primary School.

The effort to bring the playground project to life has been in the works for about two years, having been led by the Williamsport Kiwanis and Rotary clubs, in partnership with the WASD Education Foundation, which serves as the project's fiscal sponsor.

Since 2019, a steering committee comprised of members from each organization has raised \$430,098 in contributions from individuals, businesses, civic groups, and nonprofit and corporate grants.

"This has been an exciting undertaking, and we've been blessed with such an outpouring of community support to fund this playground and to help bring it to realization," said Wayne Fausnaught, committee chair and Williamsport Kiwanis Club member.

Installation could begin as early as mid-June.

At about 9,400 square feet, the playground will primarily serve the city's central and east-end communities, complete with features and equipment that contribute to the five elements of inclusive play. Plans include poured rubber flooring, accessible ramps for wheelchairs and other assistive devices. It also will have traditional equipment and structures that encourage imaginative and cognitive play, as well as fitness and instrumental activities.

Fausnaught said the group is still looking to raise an additional \$80,000 to support an expansion of the poured rubber flooring so that it covers the entire surface area of the playground to increase safety and equipment



accessibility.

Plans for the project originally called for the playground to be installed at Stevens Primary. However, just before the pandemic hit, the committee was approached by members of the Cochran Primary PTO, which was beginning its own fundraising effort to support an upgrade to Cochran's playground.

"Over the course of the last several months, that conversation evolved into what it would look like if our efforts merged," Fausnaught said. "As time went on, we explored the benefits of moving the location of the playground from Stevens to Cochran. The risk of duplication of effort notwithstanding, the idea of a new location revealed some stronger benefits, primarily its accessibility, it being more walkable and central to both school communities, more visible in terms of security, and provides an East End playground as an answer to the new West End playground at Memorial Park."



WAHS SENIOR RAISES, DONATES \$16,616 TO BENEFIT LOCAL ORGANIZATIONS

WAHS senior **Cecilia Fink**'s charity Be You Boldly granted a combined \$16,616 to K's for Cancer and the River Valley Regional YMCA's Livestrong Program in February, marking her final donation as a high school student.

The donations were comprised of funds raised through Fink's fourth annual Pie Day 5K held on Thanksgiving morning, a Zumbathon in August and her jewelry sales throughout the year.

The donation was split, with \$8,513.64 going to K's for Cancer and \$8,103.53 to the Livestrong Program.

Created in the memory of Justin Flannery Hilton, K's for Cancer raises money to provide direct and immediate support to cancer patients and their families in Lycoming County. The Livestrong Program is a 12-week program designed to help adult cancer survivors improve their fitness and quality of life.

Since 2014, Fink's work has generated

more than \$63,000 for local charities, surpassing her goal of raising \$60,000 by the time she graduates high school. She lifted her original goal of raising \$50,000 last year.

Fink also has joined the K's for Cancer board of directors and is excited to help them grow their reach in serving more cancer patients through her efforts.

She graduates from WAHS in June. She plans to attend either the University of Pittsburgh or Carnegie Mellon to study psychology and intends to focus on the field of youth counseling.

The Fulbright Teachers for Global Classrooms Program is a year-long professional development opportunity for elementary, middle and high school teachers to develop skills for preparing students for a competitive global economy.

The program equips teachers to bring an international perspective to their schools through targeted training, experience abroad and global collaboration.

Fulbrighters address critical global challenges in all fields, while building relationships, knowledge and leadership in support of the long-term interests of the United States.

"My participation in the program comes from the desire to use technology to connect students across the globe," she said. "Even at a young age, we can begin to foster a generation of students that see the beauty of another people and land. As educators, I hope that we can create a culture of empathy and understanding borders of cultures, backgrounds and race. Fostering a mindset of the global community is imperative to future generations."

Since 1946, the Fulbright Program has given over 390,000 passionate and accomplished students, scholars, teachers, artists and professionals of all backgrounds and fields the opportunity to study, teach and conduct research, exchange ideas, and contribute to finding solutions to important international problems.

After spending time abroad in Germany this summer, Nenadal said her program will come to an end in August with a capstone project that will serve as a resource for the Williamsport community.

LYCO VALLEY AWARDED \$19,540 GRANT FOR IMMERSIVE VIRTUAL CLASSROOM

Lycoming Valley Intermediate School was awarded a \$19,540 grant that will allow its large group instruction room to convert to an immersive virtual classroom through an all-in-one projection system.

Further advancing on 21st-century learning in the classroom, the grant supported the purchase and installation of a Broomx 360 all-in-one projection system "to create immersive experiences in real space," according to sixth-grade teacher Daniel Woleslagle, who facilitated the grant process and led up its implementation this winter.

"Whether this is a virtual trip to a museum, standing on a foreign planet or visiting ancient Egypt, students will have the walls and ceiling of their classroom virtually transformed into any 360-degree image or video available," Woleslagle said.

The grant comes from the First Community Foundation Partnership of Pennsylvania through Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) donations received from Citizens & Northern, First National Bank of PA, M&T Bank, UPMC Health Plan and Woodlands Bank.

The Broomx system is housed in the school's large group instruction room so that remains available to all teachers in all content areas in grades four to six.

In addition to an impressive audiovisual sensory experience, the equipment provides an opportunity for shared learning experiences for students simultaneously, Woleslagle said.


"This provides for a shared technologic immersion into experiences that are only

read about currently," he said. "This allows the possibility of endless experiences to enhance not only engagement but understanding as well."

REIMAGINING EDUCATION

CONNECTING STUDENTS TO A CHANGING LANDSCAPE OF 21ST-CENTURY LEARNING

It goes without saying that COVID-19 created an historic disruption to the world of education in 2020. However, it also prompted innovative advancements to WASD's technology infrastructure that will serve a valuable purpose long after the global health crisis is over.

hile 2020 kicked off the start of a new decade that unpredictably ushered in with it a wave of unprecedented challenges, it may also have brought along with it what could very well be a new era in public education.

WASD has been no stranger to innovation or implementing cutting-edge technology in its work to advance the delivery of 21st-century instruction. In fact, its made it a point of pride as being chief among its competitive qualities as the area's largest school district.

It's true there's little good to be found in the pandemic's grip, but, educationally speaking, it accelerated the district's technology plan that will have a lasting benefit — and advantage — for learning and instruction when the health crisis abates.

Here at WASD, the 2020-2021 school year began with the rollout of a new 1:1 initiative, "Log In, Learn On," that included a mass distribution of Chromebooks to every student. It also deployed its new K-12 online learning platform, Schoology.

Within months, the district was able to position itself to provide

the flexibility to pivot from the traditional, brick-and-mortar model of instruction to fully remote instruction — or, in some cases, a combination of the two.

"I believe there is a bright side to the challenges of education during COVID-19 in what we learned, adapted to, and how we reinvented our teaching and learning practices to flexibly and proactively respond to the needs of our students and families," said Assistant Superintendent Dr. Susan Bigger.

Bigger described the last 12 months as transformative for education, and acknowledged the Board of Education's support by quickly acting to invest the crucial resources required to ensure learning continued.

"Our teachers and administrators rose to these challenges and, through extensive professional development starting in the summer and throughout the school year, learned new skills that deepened their use of technology to deliver a 21st-century experience," Bigger said.

"I am proud of their work and dedication to students," she added. "As a district, we learned that we could reinvent, innovate, and swiftly change how we do our work. It's no small task, but this new learning will benefit our students and have a legacy that will far outlive the pandemic."




